Peggy L. Chinn, RN, PhD, FAAN is Professor Emerita of Nursing at the University of Connecticut. Her BS in nursing is from the University of Hawaii, and Master's and PhD degrees from the University of Utah. She is the Editor of [Advances in Nursing Science](#). She speaks and authors books and journal articles on nursing theory, feminism and nursing, the art of nursing, nursing education, and LGBTQ health. She is co-founder and web manager for [LavenderHealth](#) and several local community groups. She blogs regularly on [her own blog](#), the [Peace & Power blog](#), as well as on blogs for [Advances in Nursing Science](#) and the [Nurse Manifest Project](#). She currently teaches doctoral level courses using hybrid methods (online and face-to-face) for the University of Connecticut, Florida Atlantic University, and Louisiana State University. She is the Co-Author, with Mickey Eliason, of the eBook "LGBTQ Cultures: What Health Care Professionals Need to Know about Sexual and Gender Diversity" 2nd Edition., and the Co-Editor, with Paula Kagan and Marlaine Smith [Philosophies and Practices of Emancipatory Nursing: Social Justice as Praxis](#). In addition, she authored *Peace and Power: New Directions for Building Community* (8th edition, 2013). This book has been used internationally by women's peace groups, nursing groups, hospital committees, church and community groups to guide their shift toward cooperative, egalitarian ways of working together. Dr. Chinn co-authored *Integrated Theory and Knowledge Development in Nursing* with Maeona K. Kramer. She co-founded Cassandra: the Radical Feminist Nurses Network (1982-1989).
